1. Familiarize yourself with the international law assigned to your group.
2. Determine the meaning of the law. What is the law's purpose? To whom is the law written, in other words, who is the audience? How can prisoners and their supporters use these laws to defend themselves?
3. Write a summary about the law and its desired effect upon prisons, prisoners—especially political prisoners—and US life in general. How could this law possibly affect your life?
4. Choose a presenter from your group who will explain to the class your analysis of the international law you studied in your group.
5. After all the presentations choose a member of your group to tape the title of your law and your summary on the wall in the proper chronological order by year.
6. Make sure to take notes of the other group's laws while those groups are presenting. You may take photos of each group's summaries at the end of all presentations.
